#### **New Pine Tree Plate**

In 2023 our State Legislature amended the law, requiring the Bureau of Motor Vehicles to issue a replacement to all Chickadee plates starting May 1, 2025. Registrants with a passenger class code, whether new or renewal registrations, may choose to receive a Pine Tree Plate, No Tree Plate or change to a different style of plate altogether. Registrants can also change from other plate styles to the Pine Tree Plate. Fees may apply.

Registrants who would like to keep their current Chickadee plate numbers may reserve their plate for a \$25.00 one-time fee. Registrants who have an active vanity, low digit, and National Guard (Passenger class code) must reserve their plates if they would like to keep their current plate number.

A license plate number can be reserved in four different ways:

Option one: maine.gov/online/reservemyplate

Option two: Through the Rapid Renewal website when renewing a vehicle registration


Option three: Going to a Bureau of Motor Vehicle branch office.

Option four: Mailing in a Reserve Plate Application (MV-62) to the Bureau of Motor Vehicle

Administrative Office.

Reserved plates will be mailed directly to the customer two to four weeks prior to their registration's month of expiration at their address.

Customer must come into the Town Office with their new reserved number plate they received in the mail, their reservation letter from the Bureau of Motor Vehicle, and we will re-register with the new plate.



#### **Your Voice in Augusta**

Over the next few months, along with my <u>bi-weekly email newsletter</u>, I look forward to keeping the people of Hermon updated about my work in the Maine Senate. Today, I want to highlight the committees that I will be serving on for this session.

During this session, I will be chairing two committees. The State and Local Government Committee, which I served on last session, works on ideas to help the functions of both state and municipal government. I have always been looking at the intersection of state and municipal government, primarily in regards to revenue sharing. Currently, the Town of Hermon will receive \$810,000 per year. When I started serving, that number was only \$367,000. That's an increase of about 115%.

I will also be serving as the chair of the Inland Fisheries and Wildlife Committee, which is responsible for overseeing legislation related to inland fisheries, wildlife research and management, hunting, fishing, trapping, hunter safety, fish hatcheries, game wardens and guides, ATVs and snowmobiles, watercraft registration and boater safety.

Finally, I'll be serving as a member on the Health Coverage, Insurance and Financial Services Committee, which works on policies related to banks and credit unions, consumer credit, health insurance, mortgages, motor vehicle insurance, occupational and professional licensing, the Office of Employee Health and Benefits, and the price of prescription drugs.

We have a fantastic lineup of events planned, and we can't wait to share them with families.

#### **Dr. Seuss Spirit Week**

To kick off the month-long reading celebration, we will be holding a fun-filled spirit week inspired by the beloved books of Dr. Seuss. Each day will feature a special theme, from wearing your favorite hat (like the *Cat in the Hat*) or wearing silly socks (like *Fox in Socks*). This is a wonderful way to engage students and make reading a joyful experience.

We are thrilled to welcome award-winning children's author Lynn Plourde to our school! #### **March Madness: Lynn Plourde Book Brackets**

In the spirit of friendly competition and literacy engagement, we will be hosting our own version of March Madness—featuring Lynn Plourde's books! Students will participate in a school-wide bracket challenge, voting for their favorite stories each round until we crown a winner. This is a great way to promote reading, discussion, and excitement around books.

#### The Importance of Early Literacy

Reading is one of the most crucial skills a child can develop. Studies show that children who are read to at least 20 minutes a day are exposed to nearly 1.8 million words per year! Additionally, early literacy skills are directly linked to future academic success—students who read proficiently by third grade are four times more likely to graduate high school on time. By fostering a strong reading foundation now, we are setting our students up for a lifetime of success. We encourage families to take part in this special week by reading together at home, discussing favorite books, and reinforcing the joy of storytelling.

#### Legislature has many big issues before it

The biggest issue facing the 132<sup>nd</sup> Legislature is addressing a substantial budget deficit brought on by a major expansion in welfare spending. We need to pass a 2026/2027 budget before we adjourn in June. MaineCare has enrollment has grown from 200,000 people to 406,000 people since 2019. Maine's Constitution requires a balanced budget, so Governor Mills is proposing new and/or increased taxes on pensions, tobacco products, cannabis, gallons of paint, drug prescriptions, ambulance services, and online streaming services.

I am opposed to raising taxes on working people to cover for irresponsible one-party spending. Especially since the proposed taxes disproportionally hit low-income people already struggling to survive in Maine. Governor Mills' previous two budgets haven't had one vote from a legislative Republican because the growth of these two budgets were unsustainable. The new proposed budget is also unsustainable without any attempt to curb the spending that created it.

I would like to see a Maine version of DOGE, a department on government efficiency to find fraud, wasteful spending and inefficiency. For starters we should ask the Governor why she is proposing 250 new state government positions when we have 1,500 unfilled state positions now. I also do not support refusing to follow the law that gives direct-care workers a cost of living increase. They take care of our loved ones every day and they are underpaid.

On another note, the Secretary of State, Attorney General, or majority Democrats should investigate the evidence of voter fraud by non-citizens reported in the media. What is the scope of the problem? To enhance the security and integrity of our elections, Maine citizens have successfully submitted 171,562 signatures to have a referendum on voter I.D. I support legislative passage of that proposal, but am o.k. with voters deciding because it is an issue strongly supported by the public.

Identity theft and data breaches are another area I am concerned about. Hopefully, the legislature can take steps to address these growing problems. #### **Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)**

#### Q: How do I prove that I am a Hermon resident?

A: Residents wishing to use the transfer station must purchase a vehicle window sticker at the Town Office or the transfer station with a <u>valid vehicle registration</u>. The sticker is to be placed on the inside windshield of the vehicle transporting the waste. The cost per sticker is \$10.00 (*No commercial/contractor use will be accepted*).

**Note:** The Hermon Transfer Station accepts only residential materials generated in Hermon.

#### Q: What materials will not be accepted at the Hermon Transfer Station?

A: Examples of unacceptable waste include: hazardous waste, paint, tires, auto parts, shingles, chemicals, any liquid waste, waste oil, medical-related waste, pathological waste, dead animals, abandoned or junk vehicles, tree stumps, telephone poles, railroad ties, metal panels greater than 8 feet long, friable asbestos materials, pesticides, sealed drums, pressurized gas cylinders & tanks (full or partially full), hot ashes, odiferous waste, and wastewater sludge.

#### Q: Where can I take a large amount of construction debris?

A: Construction and demolition debris can be taken to the Pine Tree landfill located off the Emerson Mill Road in Hampden. Please call Pine Tree at 207-862-4200 if you have any questions regarding dates, times, or fee schedules.

#### Q: Does the Town of Hermon recycle?

A: Zero sort and cardboard recycling is available at the Town Office parking lot. Cardboard boxes must be broken down before disposal.

#### Q: Does the Town of Hermon have specialty recycling at the Transfer Station?

A: Yes, specialty recycling includes, but is not limited to electronics waste, televisions, monitors, and fluorescent lamps.

#### Q: Does the transfer station take grass clippings and leaves?

A: Yes, the transfer station now accepts <u>clean</u> leaves and grass only at our compost area – free of charge. Contaminated grass and leaf waste will not be accepted at the compost area.

#### Q: How do I dispose of brush and tree limbs?

A: We are unaware of a company accepting brush or tree limbs.

- 4. The organization does not have its primary purpose marketing products or services or making a profit.




